

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Aboyne expedition



From the Treasurer

It is really great to be back flying at Booker. And what a year 2022 has been. I thought Covid was bad enough, but we were prevented from flying at our home airfield and then our temporary home was ploughed up. It meant that we could not provide any flying to members up to September. Therefore, we deferred the start of the membership year to October and given that we don't have a full time CFI any more we have reduced the membership fee from £845 to £745. We have fewer members than we had, but I am pleased to report that we have just reached 60 full flying members only a few weeks after starting up again. We need to get back up to around 100 full members again which I hope that we can do in the next couple of years. I am truly humbled by the loyalty and commitment of the members to our club.

CAA consultation on licensing and medicals

When the UK left the EU we also left EASA, and this handed back the regulation of pilot licensing to the CAA. One result of this was that a number of old national licences that we thought were not usable for anything other than flying vintage and home-built aircraft have now come back into play.

^{*}Note no pro rata reductions for late joiners

The CAA set up a working group to look at licensing, with the aim of simplifying the options and bringing in one licence with different levels. As sailplane licensing has not been fully implemented, it has also been included in this consultation.

Almost at the same time as the licensing consultation came out, the CAA has proposed a review of medical standards for the Pilot Medical Declaration. It is worth remembering that the CAA's Pilot Medical Declaration based on driving licence standards is probably the best thing that the CAA has done for gliding. The loss of this going forward would be damaging.

The BGA has now issued advice on how to respond to the consultations and the links below will take you to the relevant pages. *Please read the BGA guidance and respond to the consultation*, as doing nothing could leave the CAA with the opinion that we are not interested, and they can then do what they like.



Seasonal thoughts - canopy care

Canopies appear strong but are easily damaged, and once broken they are difficult and expensive to repair or replace. There are a few basic precautions that can help us avoid canopy mishaps, particularly as we experience stronger winds during the autumn and winter:

Do not leave a canopy open and unattended unless some method of preventing it from closing is designed in, eg a lift up instrument panel. Take care in strong winds, where even a canopy held by a gas strut can be slammed closed, or stressed and therefore damaged in the direction of opening.

- Seek help to support canopies while getting in and out of gliders.
- → When seated in the glider, leave the canopy open and unlocked (and supported in strong winds), or closed and locked.
- → When opening and closing a canopy, be very careful about applying a load to the direct vision opening or direct vision panel rails.
- → Do not reach through a direct vision opening to pull the cable release, this will apply stresses to the transparency which will eventually result in cracks. Opening the canopy or using the back-release are much better alternatives.



- → If a canopy will not close, do not force it. Stop, open the canopy and check.
- → Clean the canopy before flight to remove greasy hand marks and reduce misting. This is particularly important at the end of the day when the sun is low and humidity increases.
- → Be sure to use the correct cleaning materials when cleaning canopies, to avoid damage.

Aerobatics courses

Graham Saw, champion aerobatics pilot and ace instructor, is running weekday aerobatics courses over the winter.

This is an opportunity not to be missed. Whether you need to hone your stall turns and rolls, or you would like to boost your confidence with some elementary figures, improving your handling skills and understanding of what a



glider will and will not do (aka the 'flight envelope') then this is for you. If interested, have a word with Graham, he's often in the workshop, and is also on Whatsapp.
